
Background & Objectives:

AACSB Standard 13 states the following: "Curricula facilitate student academic and professional engagement appropriate to the degree program type and learning goals." To meet this standard AACSB-accredited institutions are expected to provide a portfolio of experiential learning opportunities that includes extracurricular activities which provide exposure to business and management in both local and diverse global contexts. Consequently, business schools are actively encouraging students to enter internships, study abroad, and participate in other forms of extracurricular activities. Business students have expanded their engagement in these activities. However, given the costs, in terms of students' time and institutional resources, it is critical that the benefits be measured. Is there a downside to participating in internships and study abroad experiences (i.e., longer time to degree)? Or do students who engage in co-curricular activities graduate faster and achieve better post-graduation placements?



First-Time Freshmen & Transfer Students



Data and Methods

Undergraduate business students who graduated in Spring 2017 or 2018.


Dependent Variable of Interest


- **Timely graduation**: First-Time Freshmen who took 4 years or less to graduate; Transfers who 2 years or less to graduate
- **Full-time Employment**: Employed, full time paid or attending graduate or professional school, full time.



DESCRIPTIVES:

Of the 1,092 graduates, 23% had completed a study abroad experience; 62% had completed an internship





FINDINGS:

No evidence that a study abroad experience impacts timely graduation and FT employment for students entering SDSU as transfer students



WHO TAKES AN INTERNSHIP? - Students who participate in an internship were more likely to be non-first generation students, female, from outside the SDSU inservice area, and entered SDSU as first-time freshmen.



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FINDINGS:

For students entering SDSU as first-time freshmen, Internships are associated with more timely graduation and employment at graduation.

FINDINGS:

For students entering SDSU as transfer students, internships are associated with employment are graduation
