Exploring Student Success at San Diego State University - Imperial Valley

BACKGROUND

- □ SDSU-IV has existed in Imperial County for 60 years. It began as a teaching university and has expanded to meet the educational needs of the community.
- □ SDSU-IV has two admission pathways: 1) Upper-division transfer and 2) Imperial Valley University Partnership (IVUP).
- □ IVUP is a joint admission program between SDSU-IV and Imperial Valley Community College. Students are half time at SDSU-IV in their first two years and fulltime in their second two years. The IVUP offers a pathway to earning a bachelor's degree in 4 years or less
- □ SDSU-IV has 1 community college (Imperial Valley College) locally to feed into the transfer pathway.
- □ SDSU-IV plans to initiate a full 4-year undergraduate option to students beginning in Fall 2019.
- ☐ Upper Division Transfer and IVUP Majors include: Criminal Justice, English, History, Liberal Studies, Mathematics, Nursing RN to BSN, Psychology, Public Administration, Social Science, Spanish.
- ☐ The Data Champions project for the first time provides an opportunity to investigate student demographics, academic characteristics, and academic success at SDSU-IV.
- ☐ This Data Champions project aligns with the Graduation Initiative 2025 and the current SDSU-IV initiative to include new 4-year bachelor's degrees and transfer pathways.

RESEARCH QUESTIONS

- ☐ What are the demographics of the students served at SDSU-IV?
- ☐ What are the academic characteristics of the students served at SDSU-IV?
- ☐ What is the profile of the 2018 SDSU-IV graduating class?
- What are 2018 graduation rates for SDSU-IV transfer students in comparison to the SDSU transfer students?
- What are the graduation rates for SDSU-IV Imperial Valley University Partnership (IVUP) students?

RESEARCH METHODS

- □ Data specifically focused on the student population at SDSU-IV were used to investigate student demographic, academic, and graduation rate information. These data were supplied by the office of Analytical Studies and Institutional Research (ASIR) at SDSU.
- ☐ Assembled a multidisciplinary team to include the SDSU-IV Associate Dean, SDSU-IV Assistant Dean of Student Affairs, the SDSU-IV Transfer Coordinator, the SDSU-IV Retention Specialist & Data Analyst, and the SDSU-IV Nursing Program Coordinator

Enrollment by Gender




Fall 2018 SDSU-Imperial Valley Student Demographics

Enrollment by Ethnicity




Enrollment by Age Group




Enrollment by Degree Type






2014 First Time Freshman Student Data for SDSU-IV



CONCLUSIONS AND FUTURE DIRECTIONS

- ☐ The SDSU-IV student body is demographically different from the SDSU campus, with a much higher proportion of local and Hispanic students. The majority are Pell grant recipients and underrepresented minority students.
- ☐ The academic characteristics of the students at SDSU-IV are favorable and GPAs average at or above a 3.0 for both upper division transfer and first time freshman students.
- □ SDSU-IV 2018 transfer student and first-time freshman graduation rates are similar or somewhat higher than for SDSU.
- ☐ Despite being a 100% commuter campus with a primarily minority and underrepresented student population, academic outcomes are positive.
- ☐ This may be due to the quasi-cohort model within each major, many high impact student development activities each year (student conferences, research mentoring, clubs & organizations) that foster engagement and sense of community, and accessible advising available through the Student Affairs component on campus.

Future Directions:

- ☐ Investigate how students progress through their majors and determine if that progression differs by major.
- ☐ Explore predictors of academic success for both upper division transfer and first-time freshman students.
- ☐ Determine how high impact activities influence engagement, continuation, and graduation.
